GRAMMY'S DAY

"Grammy." It was Sunday, August 31st, my father's birthday and the last day of the Lott Family Reunion. Grammy attended church with us, took a nap, and then she came to the bowling alley to join the family while we bowled a few games. As soon as she got there, never one to hold her tongue, she promptly stated, "if I had known I was going to a bowling alley, I would have stayed at the hotel and slept!"

Tracy, one half of the tireless and selfless Grammy

Caretaking Duo, soon took her back to Baytown to rest and Mom, Mike, and I picked her up from Tracy's to take her home later on that evening.

In the previous weeks and months Grammy had forgotten how to do simple things like drink from a straw. Mom and Tracy spent a great deal of time trying to sort out what was going on in that eternally stubborn, now often confused head of hers. Just the night before, Grammy had turned to me in the car and said, "who are you?" Yet on this night she was as sharp as a tack. While Mom and I watched in humorous amazement from the back seat, she gave Mike flawless directions home at night as if it was the most natural thing for her to do.

At the house, the four of us sat around the table talking before going to bed and Grammy again dazzled us with a detailed account of the genealogy on her side of the family. This same woman who had set off the house alarm the previous week at 3:00 in the morning because she, completely dressed, had decided she needed to go somewhere, was now sitting at the kitchen table giving us a complete account of her family history.

Later, Grammy sat on the side of her bed as Mom undressed her, checked her bandages, and put her gown on. Mom then kneeled

before her and rubbed lotion on Grammy's legs. From the look on her face, you could tell that Grammy was "in pig heaven." Mom then left the room after asking me to give her her pill. After I struggled for quite awhile trying to get the back off of the pill package, Grammy (having more common sense than me) told me to just use her nail file to pry it open. I then took off her earrings, kissed her on the forehead, and walked towards the door. The last time I saw Grammy as herself was when I looked back to see her smiling with her cherished TV remote in her hand, ready to turn that darn TV on as loud as she could get it and then go to sleep leaving it on for the rest of us to "enjoy" (her nightly ritual). The next time I saw her was the next day when the paramedics wheeled her out of the house on a stretcher...

When I look back on that Sunday night, it reaffirms for me that God will provide for each of us. It may have been Grammy's time but before she went home she was given a full day, a good day. She went to church that morning; she shared memories with her family that evening; she peacefully and happily went to sleep knowing that she was loved. I don't think that any of us can rightfully ask for more.
